ART AND STORY TELLING AS A PATHWAY TO RECONCILIATION.

For over 12 years students have been creating art and writing that celebrates Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people's cultures, histories, languages, stories and the call for all Australians to participate in reconciliation. [The Schools Reconciliation Challenge](#) is a free annual art and writing program open to all NSW and ACT primary and secondary students in stages 2-5. Teachers and students are encouraged to use the curriculum-based resources online to inspire, learn and create a culturally inclusive classroom.

Each year we explore a different theme, in 2021 the theme is [Under One Sky: Yesterday, Today and Forever](#).

Artworks and writing are showcased in an exhibition launched at the Powerhouse Museum and then exhibited in the public foyers of International Towers at Barangaroo in Sydney. The exhibition also travels to regional locations throughout NSW and the ACT supported by the National Trust.

FREE RESOURCES FOR THE CLASSROOM

Both the Schools Reconciliation Challenge and the Reconciliation NSW website offer online resources to support teachers and educators learn about a range of subjects.

Students are encouraged to express themselves and to engage in practical exercises such as participating in talking/yarning circles, reading and evaluating stories and articles, understanding truth telling and race-relations, as well as practicing their art and writing skills.

UNDER ONE SKY: YESTERDAY, TODAY & FOREVER

For more than 60,000 years First Nations People have looked up at the sky, to understand the world around them. Using their observations of the stars, planets, Moon, Sun and the atmosphere to predict weather changes & tides, to navigate on land & water and to plan food gathering, hunting, trading, ceremony as well as pass down stories through the generations.

Looking up and reading the skies was, and still is, an important way to understand, interact with and develop connection to Country and know our place in the universe. The skies are also a source of magic, mystery and meaning told through dreaming stories of the creation of the sun and moon. Sharing stories under the stars is also a way of passing on Aboriginal lore to children, about family, traditions, culture and history.

The Schools Reconciliation Challenge is coordinated by Reconciliation NSW, the peak body for advancing reconciliation in NSW. Our work is guided by Aboriginal voices, with the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples to self-determination at the forefront.

FREE ONLINE WORKSHOPS

Each year the Schools Reconciliation Challenge coordinates free online workshops. We have worked with the Department of Education's Arts Unit, the Powerhouse Museum, Red Room Poetry and Sydney Story Factory to present a range of contemporary and traditional understandings of First Nations cultures, Languages, art and technology and inspire students to create art and writing.

Reconciliation in Education



We partner with Reconciliation Australia's Narragunnawali: Reconciliation in Education program to support all schools and early learning services in Australia to foster a high level of knowledge and pride in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories, cultures and contributions. [Narragunnawali's online platform](#) is free to access and provides practical ways to introduce meaningful reconciliation initiatives in the classroom, around the school and with the community. Through the Narragunnawali platform, schools and early learning services can develop a [Reconciliation Action Plan](#) (RAP), and teachers and educators can access professional learning and curriculum resources to support the implementation of reconciliation initiatives.



HELP FOR TEACHERS

The Schools Reconciliation Challenge recognises that some teachers need support when teaching Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories, themes and issues. We offer guidance for culturally competent teaching, access to professional development webinars and subject

guides that covers the range of primary and secondary curriculum. Feedback from teachers demonstrates the value and benefits of participation, 75% of teachers surveyed had greatly improved *understanding* of reconciliation; 69% had greatly improved *confidence* to explore reconciliation themes in the classroom; 81% significantly more *inspired* to incorporate Indigenous perspectives in the classroom.
