NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK

ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF COUNTRY



The information the map is based on is contested and may not be agreed to by some Traditional Custodians. The borders between groups are purposefully represented as slightly blurred and do not claim to be exact. We work with communities to update spellings on the map as they are amended by each community.

Working within sectors, local Aboriginal communities, & reconciliation groups to promote respectful relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait people and other Australians.

CO-CHAIRS REPORT

Welcome to our Reconciliation NSW Annual Report 2021.

Momentum in a challenging year

It has been an exciting and momentous year for Reconciliation NSW, with our Schools Reconciliation Challenge quadrupling in size since 2020, our continued partnerships with local councils, and increased interest in our activities on social media and in our organisational membership program.

This year builds on the work and achievements by our staff, our volunteers, our partners and our allies over the past 24 years. It is recognition that Reconciliation NSW has inspired our public to act. And this work has also continued at a local level, with our Local Reconciliation Groups and members ensuring these conversations continue to happen.

As we enter our 25th year, it's incredible to see more momentum in this space!

As with most small organisations, and the wider community, Covid-19 has continued to impact the way we operate. Our staff have been incredible in adapting to this new way of working, bringing our work online to connect with staff and students, along with partners who are often at the start of their reconciliation journey. It is great to see more interest and desire for knowledge across the State.

Education is the cornerstone of what we do

Reconciliation in education continues to be a cornerstone for Reconciliation NSW, a key focus of the daily work our organisation undertakes.

We have reached hundreds of teachers and students across the State, often online, to share the work we are doing and take them on a journey of change. We provide a safe space for questions, to build knowledge and awareness, which in turn gets presented in the

classroom to empower future generations of culturally safe citizens.

We have continued our partnership with Reconciliation Australia's Narragunnawali program to support all schools and early learning services in NSW to foster a high level of knowledge and pride in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories, cultures and contributions.

We have also continued our Pathways to Reconciliation work, partnering with three councils and 11 schools to deliver this program and build meaningful relationships between Aboriginal people and the local schools.

Our sustainability remains a key focus

As noted last year, our focus remains on our organisation sustainability – working to increase and diversify our revenue so we can continue to do all the great work we are doing.

We are optimistic that in our 25th year, Government will acknowledge our efforts in the education domain and support this work.

And we want to acknowledge our major funding partners for their incredible contributions throughout the year: Aboriginal Affairs NSW, Reconciliation Australia, International Towers Sydney, City of Sydney, City of Parramatta and Inner West Council.

Special thanks should also be made to King & Wood Mallesons for their ongoing contributions to our legal and organisational requirements.

We are immensely proud of our efforts this year, and of our ability to deliver so much. Thank you to our Board, staff, volunteers, partners and members for your commitment.

2020-21 FINANCES

Income received for the 2020 - 2021 financial year totalled \$441,727. This increased income, as compared to the previous financial year's income (2019 - 2020: \$286,406) is mainly due to the higher funding received from the NSW State Government (\$240,000) and from non-government grants and donations (totalling \$141,755), as well as \$38,254 of Covid-19 government stimulus funding and increased membership of \$7,959. Non-government grants and donations represent 32% of total funding, an increase from 2020 (28%).


We continued to operate with minimal staff, with our expenditure focusing on expanding our core programs, particularly reconciliation in education activities through the Schools Reconciliation Challenge, and the Narragunnawali Program, growing our continued partnerships with local councils through the Pathways Program, and supporting the increased interest from our activities on social media and in our organisational membership program. Expanding our funding opportunities is also a continued focus for us.

With total operational expenditure of \$401,319, there was an annual profit from our activities of \$40,408 – a great result considering the challenges of Covid-19. This surplus is due to ongoing prudent budget planning and management, additional funding support secured from non-government sources, as well as additional donations and membership fees.

At year-end our net asset position was \$148,831. This surplus, along with ongoing secured funding from non-government organisations and an increase from the NSW government, will allow us to continue to expand our activities in 2021 - 2022 across education, government, corporate and regional NSW.

We gratefully acknowledge and thank our funders, members and partners for their continued support.

IN EDUCATION

Reconciliation is a critical and ongoing process with education the key to positive change.

NARRAGUNNAWALI PROGRAM

We partner with Reconciliation Australia to support schools and early learning services in NSW to:



- foster knowledge and pride in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories, cultures and contributions.
- access the free online platform
- introduce meaningful reconciliation initiatives in the classroom, around the school and with the community
- develop Reconciliation Action Plans (RAPs)
- access professional learning and curriculum resources progressing reconciliation.

SCHOOLS RECONCILIATION CHALLENGE

This annual writing and art program for young people across NSW and the ACT:

- Meets the objectives of the K-6 and 7-10 syllabus
- Asks students to create art and writing celebrating Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples cultures, histories, languages
- Encourages all Australians to participate in reconciliation
- Provides education resources, activities and lesson plans on the SRC website, related to an annual theme
- Provides prize packs of resources to finalists and their schools to further their reconciliation journey



IN COMMUNITIES

Allies are hearing the call for truth, equality, justice and healing and asking us how they can support reconciliation.

First Peoples make up 3.5% of the population of NSW. We work to support, inform and inspire the 97% of people living in NSW who are not Aboriginal, so they can play a role in, and take responsibility for, driving reconciliation – led by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

We engage with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and organisations in NSW to ensure our work is relevant, aligned with community voices and promotes self-determination.

LOCAL RECONCILIATION GROUPS

We support an independent network of 23 Local Reconciliation Groups to promote reconciliation in their local communities. Most groups meet regularly, create and host events such as workshops, concerts, walks, tours and cultural gatherings, and have invaluable information about local Aboriginal histories and cultures and are happy to share it.

IN GOVERNMENT

SUPPORTING LOCAL COUNCILS

Our local council work to achieve reconciliation involves: encouraging Aboriginal representation on local councils, improving cultural awareness and engagement with Aboriginal communities by council, supporting council RAPs, responding to requests for information, events, workshops, exhibitions and projects.

PATHWAYS PROGRAM - ART ON FENCES

With local council partners, we deliver art and storytelling workshops in schools and early learning centres to produce public art exhibitions, bringing improved:

- · Connection to Country for students, schools and community
- Community engagement and wellbeing via public art exhibitions
- Cultural appreciation and true history sharing, welcoming local Aboriginal communities
- Relationships between teachers, students and local Aboriginal communities

RECONCILIATION IN NSW PARLIAMENT

This series of events continues the NSW Parliament's bi-partisan commitment to reconciliation. They allow Parliamentarians to hear the voices of First Peoples on issues that affect them, and are a forum for positive dialogue. Since 2006, the series has profiled issues including youth incarceration, stolen wages, housing, healing through language and culture, treaty and agreement making, and community resilience via the community controlled health sector. AMPLIFY ABORIGINAL VOICES!

Guided by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices, we contribute to policy discussions to advance social justice, equity and self-determination, including justice reinvestment, reparations, treaty, truth-telling, constitutional reform and cultural heritage protection.

In NSW, we support #NSWJustReinvest and #FlyTheFlag campaigns, as well as various requests from local reconciliation groups to support local initiatives relating to the protection of sacred and historical sites of significance important to Aboriginal communities. We promote and encourage more Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to stand for local government elections to increase representation at a community level.

Reconciliation NSW supports national priorities including those of the Coalition of Aboriginal Peak Organisations, #Raise the Age, #ChangetheRecord, #FamilyMatters, #RacismltStopsWeithMe and #BlackLivesMatter campaigns as well as the Uluru Statement From the Heart.

VOICE TREATY TRUTH

The Uluru Statement from the Heart is an invitation to the people of Australia to "walk with us in a movement of the Australian people for a better future". The key reforms it outlines, Voice Treaty Truth, provide an opportunity for Australia to acknowledge our history and move forward together in a genuine process of reconciliation.

Achieving these reforms will depend on enough political and community goodwill to reach a position that can be supported by the majority of Australians– Indigenous and non-Indigenous.

We support a constitutionally enshrined Voice to Parliament, and work towards achieving treaty making and truth telling as called for in this historic document.
